







WOMEN IN SELF-EMPLOYMENT IN THE CARIBBEAN

...while the majority of self-employed females have less than five employees








WOMEN IN SELF-EMPLOYMENT IN THE CARIBBEAN





WOMEN'S ENTREPRENEURSHIP SUPPORT (WES) PROJECT

Ten women entrepreneurs in the agribusiness sector in Jamaica received stipends valued at \$100,000 Jamaica Dollars to scale their businesses under WES in September 2021.

The WES Project aimed to positioning women entrepreneurs to maximize opportunities and growth for development.
