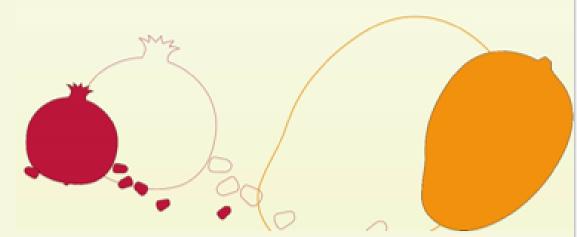

DUAL RESPONSIBILITY

SOUND PRODUCTION & SAFE TRADE

Product traded need to be safe from a PLANT HEALTH perspective and respect EU production rules, otherwise they cannot be imported. But products imported need to be safe from a FOOD SAFETY perspective, otherwise no trust in products by the consumers.

CUSTOMER & CONSUMERS DEMANDS

Making sure that the shelves are full year-round with a wide diversity of fresh produce to satisfy customers demands and expectations.

Rebalance the discussion between the three pillars of sustainability, particularly the economic

Create added value and incentives for producers search for equivalence and certification harmonisation

DUAL CHALLENGE

PRODUCING IN CHANGING WORLD

Climate change is already having a very real impact on yield, growing conditions, pests and other diseases.

Adding to that geopolitcal shifts that have a real impact on trade routes, creating trade diversions, and uppending trade rules as we know them.

RESULTING IN EVOLVING DEMANDS

GOAL TO SPEED UP TOWARDS CLIMATE NEUTRALITY THROUGH WIDE-RANGING REGULATION: PPWR (AUGUST 2026), DEFORESTATION REGULATION (2025-2026), CSRD, CSDDD, WHILE AT THE SAME TIME CALLING FOR SIMPLIFICATION AND LESS RED TAPE (OMNIBUS REGULATIONS)

=> Lack of clarity



Fresh produce challenge to adapt to societal concerns and supermarket demands





Policy (in)coherence, overlap of requirements, no overlap of audits

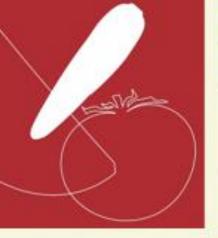
